The awards are to be achieved in the above order except the Community Services. A Community Service award must be earned at least once before one may attain the Golden Thunderbird award.

Golden Thunderbird

The Golden Thunderbird is the highest level a child can attain in the Indian Guides program. The child and their family should be very proud of all their hard work upon achieving this award.

The child, their parents and their Tribal Chief will prepare a list of nine tasks to be completed, three in each of these catagories: Service to the Community, Service to the Tribe, Service to the Family. In this way we can insure that the tasks are appropriate for the childs age and personal interests.

This list will then be presented to a Council of Chiefs appointed by the Federation Chief to review the tasks. This will insure that the tasks are worthy of a Golden Thunderbird award. Once approved the child can go forth and earn their award.

Some past tasks approved:

Community: speak to the school board, update YMCA Indian Guides display at YMCA, trailwork on the Barton Creek greenbelt.

Tribe; design tribal banner, design tribal sash for awards, design tribal t shirt.

Family; cook a dinner and clean up after, plant grass and establish growth, clean garage and organize, clean a room and paint it.

It helps the child if a binder is made to record progress and photographs.
